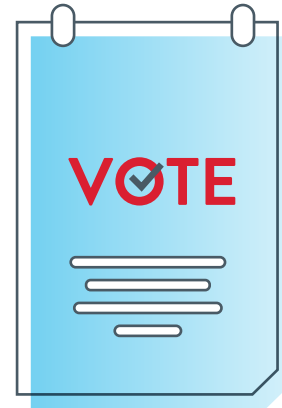

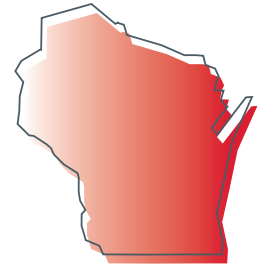
Remember, every vote counts and is an opportunity for bankers to make their voices heard!

Posters and Flyers

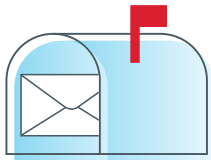

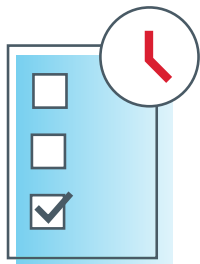


Vote by Mail



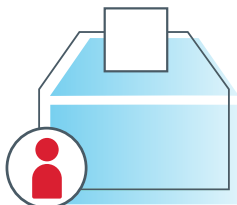
The last day to request an absentee ballot from the state is Aug. 4 for the primary and Nov. 3 for the general election. Completed absentee ballots must be received by 8 p.m. on Election Day. Find information on how to request an absentee voting ballot at the State of Wisconsin Elections Commission's website, myvote.wi.gov.

Early Voting

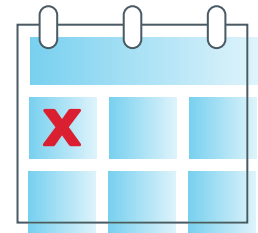
Vote in Person

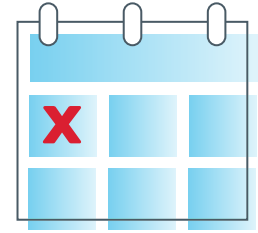

Vote by Mail

The last day to request an absentee ballot from the state is Aug. 4 for the primary and Nov. 3 for the general election. Completed absentee ballots must be received by 8 p.m. on Election Day. Find information on how to request an absentee voting ballot at the State of Wisconsin Elections Commission's website, myvote.wi.gov.

Early Voting

Early voting in Wisconsin varies by county. Depending on where you live, early voting could start as July 26 for the primary and Oct. 25 for the general election. Contact your election officials to find early voting sites and schedules in your county.

Vote in Person

Vote in person on Aug. 9 and Nov. 8. You can cast your vote between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. at your polling location. Check the Wisconsin Elections Commission's website, myvote.wi.gov, for information about voting requirements.

Templates

You may use your bank's internal communications tools, e.g. intranet, email, or staff meetings to encourage staff to participate in upcoming elections. Any communication to staff should include nonpartisan information that will help them to vote. You may include polling hours and location information, voter information website, and election date reminders and deadlines.

To help you get started, use the template below to help motivate, remind and provide timely information about upcoming elections to your employees.
